We have also continued to recruit and train rescued dogs to become rescuers and build a campus that is the only training facility in the world designed specifically for Canine Disaster Search — no easy feat!

Reflecting on 2015, we surpassed milestones such as our third international deployment with 6 SDF-trained Search Teams completing an 18-day mission to Nepal, and breaking ground on the Welcome Center at the NTC.

In 2016, we celebrate our 20th Anniversary Year, the opening of the Canine Pavilion at the NTC and all our staff, canines and Search Teams moving into their new home. For 20 years, SDF has not had a place of its own to call home and now, after the hard work of so many, we look forward to all coming together in our new permanent home — the National Training Center.

We are so grateful to everyone who has helped make our work possible over the last 20 years. Thank you for appreciating the two- and four-legged heroes who have boots and paws on the ground when the call for help comes in. It is your enduring support that makes the work we do possible.

SDF Highlights 2015

The generous support of SDF's stakeholders in 2015 enabled the Search Dog Foundation to turn rescued dogs into rescuers and strengthen the nation's disaster response network.

- Deployments SDF Search Teams searched for survivors on 17 deployments in California, Florida, New York, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, Texas, Utah, Virginia and Kathmandu, Nepal.
- New Search Teams 7 new Search Teams were formed in California (Los Angeles County, San Francisco-Menlo Park and Sacramento).
- Search Team Certifications 11 Search Teams achieved Certification; 11 Re-Certified.
- Canine Recruitment 471 dogs were evaluated for Urban Search and Rescue at 17 shelters and rescues. Regional Canine Recruiters across the country helped 12 dogs enter our training program.
- Canine Career Change and Lifetime Care 4 canines who were recruited but didn't quite have what it takes for disaster search were Career Changed. 3 dogs found their "fur-ever" homes in Southern California!
- Stakeholders SDF is grateful to 2,728 individuals, 141 foundations, 32 companies, 47 organizations, and 3 schools across all 50 states and 4 countries outside of the US who made gifts in 2015.
- Endowment Guardians We welcomed 13 new Guardians who included SDF in their Estate plans in 2015, bringing our total number to 250. At the close of 2015, our Endowment was valued at \$3,011,098.
- Search Dog Sponsors We are grateful to 13 individuals, companies, and family foundations who have donated \$10,000 or more in 2015 to become the special Sponsor of a Search Dog.
- Volunteers 60 individuals have generously given their time and talent at events and in the office, some working from home on nights and weekends, to keep SDF operating at peak performance.
- Workplace Giving We received \$97,453 from government, state and private sector employees who gave through the Combined Federal Campaign (CFC), their State Employee Campaign, the United Way, and 59 different company matching programs.

CELEBRATING 20 YEARS OF SERVICE TO AMERICA



There is an old saying I am sure you've heard before — "Time flies when you're having fun." At 82 years of age, I can appreciate that sentiment. How the years really do pass by when our hearts and minds are engaged in something we are deeply passionate about. For me, the past 20 years have flown by swiftly in such a marvelous fashion, and I continue to be amazed and inspired at how far we have come together since I was deployed to the Oklahoma City bombing with my Search Dog Murphy in April 1995.

You see, when I returned from that life-changing event, I had what seemed like a crazy notion to start an organization that could take rescued dogs and train them to save lives in the hands of first responders. So, with a small group of dedicated volunteers (working out of my home and using my coffee table as a headquarters), I set out on a journey that has led us to today. As I write this, I am humbled and honored to proudly say that SDF has grown into a nationwide agency with 68 Canine Disaster Search Teams from coast to coast. SDF-trained teams across America are ready to deploy at a moment's notice, and have served our country and beyond for two decades.

SDF has worked with hundreds of shelters and rescues to recruit rescued dogs and turn them into rescuers. Our teams have responded to over a hundred deployments all over the US and the world. Now for the very first time in SDF's history we will have a permanent place to call home at the National Training Center! When our staff moves to the Petco Foundation Canine Pavilion in June of 2016 we will have a much larger coffee table to work around!

But what truly amazes me is YOU — all of this has been made possible by your generosity, and your belief in that seemingly crazy idea that popped into my mind all the way back in 1996. We are here today because of YOU. And we are unbelievably grateful.

From our very first three Search Teams beginning their search training in January 1996 to the 13 SDF teams that responded to Ground Zero after 9/11 to our entire staff and canines moving into the NTC in June of 2016, these two decades mark immeasurable growth, learning, trust, and inspiration.

I invite you to join us in celebrating our milestones and successes over the last 20 years. And as we march together into the future, I look forward to continuing this journey with you!

THE NATIONAL TRAINING CENTER

The Search Dog Foundation is building a National Training Center (NTC), the first and only facility designed specifically for Canine Disaster Search Teams. Located on 125 acres in the foothills above Santa Paula, CA, 90 minutes north of Los Angeles, the center will feature disaster simulation props and sites that will provide the Search Teams with the advanced deployment readiness training they'll need for all types of disasters. Disaster simulation scenarios include a train wreck, plane crash, bus accident, a tornado-stricken "Search City," and various rubble piles.

Moving into Our New Home

While our Search Dog candidates have been training daily on the campus since 2012, we will be moving into the completed Petco Foundation Canine Pavilion in June of 2016, marking the official arrival of our canines and Program staff to their permanent home!

Featuring state-of-the-art kennels, a fully equipped medical clinic, classrooms and staff offices, the Canine Pavilion is a full-service canine care facility and learning center unlike anything else in the nation. Housed in this exceptional

As an excited crowd looked on, the McGrath Family – longtime friends and supporters of the Search Dog Foundation – turned over the first historic shovelfuls of dirt at the site where this prominent structure will rise.

Construction of the Welcome Center and the neighboring Bechtel Handlers' Lodge will begin in the summer of 2016. We're looking forward to the completion of these beautiful structures so we can offer a proper welcome to our visiting handlers and guests!

THE NATIONAL TRAINING CENTER


Working Together with Our Troops to Bring the Gift of the NTC to the Nation

Thanks to our three-year partnership with the U.S. military, SDF once again has been selected to participate in the Innovative Readiness Training (IRT) program. This program allows our military service members to gain valuable, hands-on experience in specified fields of construction in preparation for their military deployments. This "win-win" arrangement also helps us build the NTC, our collective gift to the nation. We are so honored and proud to be working alongside our nation's troops!

During the 2015 program, 156 Seabees completed essential components of our "Search City" training area, including the Convenience Store and framing of the Tilted House and façade structures. They also helped complete critical roadway and drainage improvements.

In 2016, the IRT program will finish construction on Search City, which includes a total of 8 buildings, a trailer park, various searchable open areas and a permanent rubble pile, providing unique search scenarios for our visiting teams. The completion of Search City will allow handlers and their canine partners opportunities to train specifically for interior and exterior building searches, as well as fully and partially collapsed buildings that they will encounter while deployed in the wake of disasters.





THE CLASS OF 2015



"One of our task force leaders said, 'Had we not had those dogs to search and clear some of the structures, it would have been impossible.' There were two-story houses and apartment buildings that we humans couldn't access. Having the dogs was an absolute necessity and blessing. Everyone we found had been in their bathtub covered by mattresses because they had gotten an alert. People did what they were told to do and it saved their lives. We had to cease search efforts twice because of the wind and rain. Regardless of being wet and cold and running into people's pets loose on the streets, the dogs knew this was their job and the real deal. The community was bringing clothes, food, and water. Dallas Parking Structure Collapse

"The collapse went from the top floor, all the way through to the bottom floor. Vehicles were hung perpendicular, flipped upside down, and pancaked. There were no less than five structural engineers present as a result of the collapse, and after their initial evaluation they determined that it was safe to send in the canines for a search. Skye "cleared" the pile with no indications or interest and Tucker and Billy followed with the same result. All three dogs were great! They knew what their job was and went straight to the task at hand. Upon completion of a thorough search by Skye, a structural engineer came up and shook my hand and said how amazing it was to watch Skye work and thanked me for our service. Along with the safety determination made by the structural engineers, accompanied by the skill set of the canines, it was comforting to him knowing that everything that could be done was being accomplished."

To be eligible to deploy with their task force, each Canine Disaster Search Team must achieve Certification through either the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) or State Urban Search & Rescue Alliance (SUSAR). Once Certified, the team must re-take the test every three years to maintain deployment readiness.

In 2015, 22 SDF teams achieved Certification or Re-Certification.



Zorro was donated to our program by a woman in Santa Cruz, CA after she recognized his excellent use of his nose and drive could do some good in the world.

Unfortunately, while Zorro's nose was fantastic, he did not enjoy climbing on rubble, meaning he would not be a Disaster Search Dog. After researching the different options, SDF's trainers found him an interesting career in Ecological Detection with H.T. Harvey and Associates - the first Career Change dog to enter this field of work! This group uses the dog's innate abilities to search out endangered species and other lifeforms that a scientist may need to study. These Ecological Detection canines, or "Eco Dogs," are able to locate and then alert scientists to any sign of the animal in the vicinity.

Mars Veterinary Wisdom Panel® The Tales Behind The Tails

Just because a Search Dog candidate may not look like a Lab, Border Collie, Golden, German Shepherd or Malinois (the top performing breeds for disaster work), does not mean that he's not the right dog for the job. Thanks to our partners at Mars Veterinary, since 2009, SDF has received 218 Wisdom Panel® Canine DNA Tests to help determine which dogs make the best candidates for canine disaster search. Thank you to our friends at Mars Veterinary for providing this valuable information and allowing us to be part of this important research!



Financial Snapshot October 1, 2014 – September 30, 2015

The Search Dog Foundation is so grateful for the enduring support of everyone who has contributed to the success of the foundation, enabling SDF to fulfill its mission of strengthening disaster response in America. The support from our loyal constituency brought in \$1.85M operationally, with 84% of our expenses used to fund our Program services. We do our best to keep overhead as low as possible while maintaining a robust program to provide support and resources to the Canine Disaster Search Teams serving our nation.

The funds raised in FY 2014-2015* enabled SDF to evaluate 471 canines, 12 of which were accepted into our training program, form 7 new Search Teams, provide 68 active Search Teams with training and support, host a Drive & Decoy workshop at the National Training Center for 10 Canine Disaster Search Teams (half of which were SDF teams), and provide 7 canines not suited for disaster search work with a Lifetime Care "fur-ever" home or new career, while continuing to support the existing 175 canines in the Lifetime Care community.

We are happy to report that SDF continues to be a Top-Rated Nonprofit based on how we raise and allocate funds, our governance and transparency, program impact and efficiency, and favorable ratings from donors and other members of the public. In 2015, SDF again was awarded the title of "Top-Rated Nonprofit" by Great



Nonprofits, an industry watchdog group. Additionally, we were awarded the Independent Charities Seal of Excellence by Independent Charities of America, an award earned by fewer than 2,000 charities out of the estimated 1,000,000 charities operating in the United States today.

We are in the midst of an exciting time! In 2016, we celebrate our 20th Anniversary, marking two decades of turning rescued dogs into rescuers in service to America. Additionally, we will be moving all staff onto the NTC campus in 2016 so our entire team can work more closely together on one site, along with the Search Teams during training. This move will bring forth new growth and expansion for SDF, giving Canine Disaster Search Teams from across the nation a place to come together, train and share valuable information and skills that enable them to be ready the next time disaster strikes.

The National Disaster Search Dog Foundation is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization – Tax ID #77-0412509. The organization has earned the designation of a "Top-Rated Nonprofit" from Great Nonprofits, an industry oversight organization.
